April Notes from the Mayor

This month the city commission will begin the process of developing the FY 2021-2022 budget. The first step is a review of the five city department budget requests for 2021-2022. Part of this effort also involves setting the property tax rate. During this process each year we often receive questions from residents about what is perceived as a high tax rate.

It is true that we have a higher tax rate than some cities. State law does not allow us to drastically cut the taxes and reduce revenue from the previous year. One of the factors is the property valuations we receive each year. Commissioner Ed Evers and Treasurer Arnold Shaikun work each year to recommend a tax rate that meets our revenue requirements for the annual budget and meets the requirements of state law while doing what we can to reduce the property tax rate.

As property valuations increase, we can decrease the tax rate and maintain our current level of revenue. The current tax rate for FY 2020-2021 is .351 cents per \$100 assessed value. This was a reduction from the FY 2019-2020 tax rate of .355 cents per \$100 of assessed value. When I first became a member of the city commission in 2015, the tax rate for FY 2015-2016 was .387 cents per \$100 of assessed value.

Our city commission has worked diligently to incrementally reduce the tax rate each year and still comply with state law. It helps that we are in a fiscally sound condition. Some residents have questioned why our tax rate is higher than some other suburban cities. The simple answer is that, unlike many suburban cities, we have only residential property in Bancroft. Most of our revenue comes from residential property taxes. Other cities have other revenue sources such as taxes on businesses. Bancroft has no businesses in our city limits.

As always, you are welcome to attend all of our city commission meetings. At the April through June meetings, you will be able to observe our deliberations on the 2021-2022 budget and tax ordinances. I will provide opportunities for you to ask questions about the process and make comments about the budget and tax rate proposals.

Police News from Chief Mudd

As the weather turns warmer, I hope to see fewer vehicles in Bancroft running unattended. Not only is this a violation of Kentucky law, but it's the easiest way for someone to steal your vehicle. It's also not necessary with today's modern vehicles and actually wastes fuel, increases pollution, and can damage your engine. According to DriversEd.com, here is what you should do instead:

Step 1. Make sure your vehicle is in a safe spot.

 It should be out in the open air, not in a garage.

Step 2. Turn on the vehicle and defroster.

 The defroster will help clear the window while the engine warms up. they will dispatch him to help you, otherwise, they will dispatch a Metro police officer. Do not personally seek out Chief Mudd to get assistance for an emergency.

Step 3. Let the engine run for 30 seconds.

 That's all it takes in most vehicles that are 30 years old or newer. If it's extremely cold and your vehicle is covered in snow or ice, give it a minute or two longer to warm up.

Step 4. Start slowly and take it easy for the first 5 to 15 minutes.

 A long period of idling can be bad for your engine. Start slowly and take it easy on the gas pedal for about 5-15 minutes. Otherwise, you could stress out your engine before it's had time to reach its normal performance levels.
