Show Your Mailbox Some Love!

Please note the following tips from the United States Postal Service.

Mailboxes take a beating from the weather, so we recommend an annual mailbox checkup to avoid damage to your mail or difficulty identifying your address.

- Tighten loose hinges on the door
- Take care of rusty or loose parts
- Replace missing or faded house numbers
- Keep the path to your mailbox clear

December Meeting Minutes

NOTES FROM CHIEF MUDD

From the Chief:

There have been some pretty serious traffic collisions in the areas around Bancroft recently, some of which have required officers to perform traffic control duties at major intersections. I wanted to provide everyone with tips to traverse through such intersections in their vehicles as safely as possible.

First, once you see the emergency lights, slow down. Look around for emergency responders who may be outside of their vehicles. Second, if there is someone directing traffic, follow their visual instructions. Be prepared to stop suddenly though as they may have to shut down traffic quickly if another emergency vehicle approaches the intersection. Third, if you need to turn, use your indicators. Letting the officer know what you want to do is important because it may not be possible for you to go in that direction due to the collision. It also helps them to maintain a steady and safe flow of traffic.

Finally, please do not stop at the intersection to ask officers the best way to get around the collision to your ultimate destination. The traffic officer is trying to watch many things at once, maintain communication with other officers that are working the accident or also directing traffic, and also keep out of the way of traffic themselves. Just continue through the intersection and find a safe place to stop and find an alternate route.

INSURANCE PREMIUM TAX FEES

We are asking for your help to ensure that your insurance company is aware that you reside in the *City of Bancroft*, not the City of Louisville. This allows Bancroft to receive the tax fee instead of Louisville.

MAKE SURE TO SIGN UP FOR REACH ALERT!

This is a reminder to all residents to sign up for Reach Alert. Our neighborhoods emergency response network. This has been used recently to notify everyone about the upcoming storm and the snow removal plan. Please take a moment to sign up now.

1. Go to [www.reachalert.com](http://www.reachalert.com) to register for the service.
2. Click on CREATE ACCOUNT (about halfway down the page in the block on the right).
3. Follow the prompts and enter your contact information so that you will receive alerts via your preferred method (text message, voice call, or email).
4. Enter Bancroft when asked which network you want to join. Just click on our name when it appears in the drop-down list.
5. Click “Resident” and enter the following registration code (case sensitive):  
BKY9113

HOW CAN WE CONTACT THE POLICE?

For immediate police assistance:

1. Emergency: **Dial 911**
2. Non-emergency police assistance: **Dial 311**

For non-urgent neighborhood concerns:

1. Call our police line at **(502) 263-3663**. Leave a voicemail with your name and phone number. Chief Mudd will call you back when he is on duty.

For your safety, please call 911 or 311 to have police dispatched. If Chief Mudd is working, then they will dispatch him to help you, otherwise, they will dispatch a Metro police officer. Do not personally seek out Chief Mudd to get assistance for an emergency.
